(ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30H JUNE, 1927.)

To HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR,

The Trustees of the Australian Museum have the bonor to submit to your Excellency their seventy-third report, being for the year ended 30th June, 1927;

1. TRUSTEES.

The resignations of two Trustees were accepted with extreme regret. Mr. Ernest Wunderlich, F.R.A.S., who had been a Trustee since April, 1914, and who was elected President in December, 1925, resigned on 6th August, 1926. Mr. Wunderlich took great interest in the affairs of the institution, to which he was a generous benefactor. The fine aboriginal group now on view was his gift, and it was at his suggestion and, above all, by his efforts that The Australian Museum Magazine was successfully launched. Sir William Vicars, elected August, 1923, resigned on 6th August; by his resignation the Board has lost the services of a Trustee whose judgment and eminent qualifications made him a valued colleague.

Dr. G. A. Waterhouse, B.E., F.E.S., was elected on 2nd July in place of the late J. J. Fletcher. The Hon. Dr. F. E. Wall, M.L.C., and Mr. F. S. Mance, Under Secretary for Mines, were elected on 1st October to fill the two vacancies caused by the resignations indicated.

On 1st October Sir Charles Rosenthal was elected as President, to hold office for the remainder of the calendar year, and in December he was re-elected for the year 1927.

A list of the Trustees, with a record of their attendances at Board meetings, is shown in Appendix A. Eleven ordinary and six special meetings were held during the year.

Three sectional committees, elected early in December, meet monthly and make recommendations to the Board on matters coming within their purview. In addition, special committees are appointed from time to time to deal with specific matters. A list of members of the committees of the year, with their attendances at meetings, is shown in Appendix B. The President is ex officio a member of each committee.

2. STAFF.

Charles Hedley, Honorary Conchologist, died on 11th September, 1926. He had been connected with the Museum for the long period of thirty-five years, and his death removes one who has done much to advance the work of the institution, not only by his voluminous scientific writings, but also by his many donations.

New appointments include that of Mr. S. G. Gray as Probationary Cadet in Ethnology, 11th April, 1927, and of Mr. J. S. Rolfe, Junior Clerk, 10th January, 1927. Mr. Arthur Barnes, Chief Attendant, retired in October, after nearly thirty years' service; he was succeeded by Mr. T. A. Murphy, formerly Clerk.

Museum officers, having made application for Awards under the Industrial Arbitration (Amendment) Act, 1926, claims were duly presented and received consideration by the Trustees. An Award, No. 346, was made for Professional Officers, and Awards for Preparators, Mechanics and Attendants were approaching the final stages towards the end of the financial year.

A list of the Staff and of Honorary Officers will be found in Appendices C and D.

3. Centenary.

There is reason for believing that the Museum had its beginning in 1827, although it was not then styled the Australian Museum. The Trustees have given consideration to the possibility of celebrating the centenary year in some fitting manner, but no finality has yet been reached.

4. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

Serious consideration has been given to the subject of the extension of the Museum buildings. The Trustees realise that the completion of the William-street facade should be their objective, and the President prepared sketch plans, which were duly considered and approved by the Board. It was resolved that the Government should be approached with a request that the necessary funds be voted, and the President, Dr. Wall, Messrs. Blair, Cambage, and McKern were deputed to wait upon the Minister for Education and place before him the urgent needs of the Museum in regard to gallery and storage space. It is eminently desirable that the centenary year of the institution should not be allowed to pass without some signal recognition, and there could be no more fitting celebration that the commencement of much needed additions.

The spirit collections have so increased that additional space is badly needed. The Department of Public Works has been approached with the request that a sum of money should be included in its estimates for the purpose of adding a second storey to the existing spirit house, and it is confidently expected that in the coming year this additional storage accommodation will be provided.

The subject of improved ventilation of the Lecture Hall was further considered. At the request of the Board a scheme was submitted and approved, but the Department of Public Works reported that it could not make available the funds necessary for the completion of the work.

Various items of repairs and maintenance have been carried out by the Department of Public Works during the year; these included work on the guttering, ceilings, roof cover moulds, painting, tarpaving and renewals of pathways.

The alteration of the William-street levels having been completed, the necessary adjustments to the stone retaining wall and goods entrance were made by the City Council.

5. Honorary Correspondents.

The following benefactors have been elected as Honorary Correspondents during the year:—Messrs. James Burns, R. H. and R. R. Dangar, A. F. Basset Hull, the Hon. Sir Alfred Meeks, M.L.C., Dr. W. E. J. Paradice, Dr. A. Jefferis Turner, Miss Eadith Walker, C.B.E. By death we have lost an Honorary Correspondent, Sir Hugh Dixson.

6. ATTENDANCE OF VISITORS.

7. Exhibits.

The principal new exhibits installed during the year include a series of skulls and skull casts illustrating the geological history of man in Europe and elsewhere. A fine group of the Queensland Lung Fish (Neoceratodus) has been added to the fish gallery. The group contains coloured casts of three specimens, with appropriate accessories, and represents a section of the river bed where these fishes live. Accessories and data for the construction of this exhibit were kindly supplied by Dr. T. L. Bancroft, of Eidsvold, Queensland. The casts were prepared by Messrs. Clutton and Kingsley, Preparators, and coloured by Miss H. E. Bailey and Miss E. A. King. A large Sawfish presented by the Manly Surf Club, was cast by Messrs. Clutton and Kingsley and coloured by Miss King. It is now exhibited in a special case, forming a central exhibit which has attracted much attention. A Ptarmigan group was placed on exhibition to illustrate the change from autumn to winter plumage. The background of this exhibit was painted by Miss King.

8. Postcards.

During the year a series of thirty coloured postcards of Australian birds was issued, the drawings having been made by Mrs. T. Iredale. The series is arranged in sets of five, each set contained in a covering envelope and accompanied by an explanatory leaflet with interesting data relating to each subject. These postcards have been well received, and the venture, designed principally for educational purposes, promises to be a complete success. Additional series illustrating our mammals, birds' eggs, fishes, and other subjects will be issued as funds permit.

9. THE AUSTRALIAN MUSEUM MAGAZINE.

This publication continues to be in demand, and is now well established as a periodical of popular natural history. During the year Volume II was completed, and parts 1 and 2 of Volume III have been issued.

10. LIBRARY.

The accessions totalled 449 volumes as detailed in Appendix F, besides a large number of parts and reprints. The relatives of the late A. R. McCulloch, formerly Ichthyologist, presented his valuable library of reprints and works of reference, the gatherings of many years. In memory of her husband, the late Charles Hedley, Mrs. H. Georgina Hedley presented a large number of his scientific papers and books. Mr. Hedley had been an extremely generous supporter of the library, spending lavishly on its behalf, and it is largely due to his efforts that the library possesses so many rare works.

Congestion is still acute, and the passage of time serves only to increase it. A library scattered through corridors and basements does not make for efficiency, yet this has been the position for years past and the remedy is still to seek. Details have been worked out for additional shelving in various workrooms, and this, when in use, will temporarily relieve the crowding. The Assistant Librarian, Mr. F. D. McCarthy, has continued his revision of the Catalogue, which is now in a fairly advanced state. Progress has been made with binding, though more could have been undertaken had additional funds been available.

The Librarian, Mr. W. A. Rainbow, has continued to devote a considerable portion of his time to editorial work and the supervision of the printing of publications. He has also been frequently called upon to assist students and the press with information.

12. FIELD WORK.

In the early part of the year Messrs. E. Le G. Troughton and A. A. Livingstone spent about two months in the Santa Cruz Group as the guests of Mr. N. S. Heffernan, District Officer. During this time they cruised among the islands and were able to secure a large and varied collection, consisting of zoological specimens, human crania, and ethnological objects. The zoological collections included over 50 rats and bats, 138 birds and reptiles, 126 fishes, over 200 species of shells, an important series of insects, and a large number of echinoderms, corals, and other marine invertebrates. The gratifying success of this expedition is a result of the hard work and enthusiasm of the two officers (who defrayed their own expenses), and the generosity and cordial assistance of our Honorary Correspondent, Mr. N. S. Heffernan. The thanks of the Board are also due to Messrs. Burns, Philp & Co., who made a substantial reduction in fares and carried all gear and collections free of charge, and to the Vanikoro Timber Company, and their manager, who provided many facilities, and whose guest Mr. Troughton was for two weeks.

Messrs. A. Musgrave and T. G. Campbell were granted leave to take part in the annual "Camp-out" of the Royal Australasian Ornithologists' Union, and spent part of October in the Williams River district, where they were successful in collecting a large series of insects and arachnids, and a number of mammals, reptiles, and amphibia.

In January, Mr. T. G. Campbell re-visited the Barrington Tops, near Dungog, and collected over 500 insects and arachnids, and a series of crustacea.

In February, Messrs. W. W. Thorpe, T. G. Campbell, and H. O. Fletcher spent a few days at Berowra Creek, where they secured a number of insects and freshwater crustacea, and searched for aboriginal burial places and skeletal remains.

By the courtesy of Mr. Douglas Hahn, Mr. W. Boardman was enabled to accompany the trawler "Gunner" on a trip which resulted in the acquisition of a number of fishes (including new species and new records), a large collection of squids and other molluses, and many echinoderms, crustacea, sponges, corals, bryozoa, and other invertebrates.

Shorter trips included visits to Gunnamatta Bay and various beaches, to National Park, and other places in the vicinity of Sydney.

13. Donations.

Special reference may be made to the following gifts.

We are indebted to the Hon. Sir Alfred Meeks, M.L.C., for a donation which enabled us to secure the valuable Robins collection of Polynesian and other ethnological specimens, and to Mr. M. S. Stanley, who purchased and presented a fine series of Papuan nose ornaments.

A bequest the value of which is inestimable is the late A. R. McCulloch's Card Index of Ichthyological Literature. This was the result of many years' assiduous labour, and contains over 150,000 entries.

The late Charles Hedley, for many years conchologist to the Museum, had compiled a comprehensive guide to the literature of conchology. This valuable adjunct to conchological research has been presented by Mrs. H. Georgina Hedley in memory of her husband. The Trustees are very fortunate in having come into possession of these systematic card indices to ichthyological and conchological works and papers, for, though the compilers are no longer with us, these aids to research are still fulfilling their function.

15. CURATORIAL.

Mammals (E. Le G. Troughton in charge).—The facilities afforded private collectors, coupled with the field work of the staff and donations by the general public, resulted in the registration of a fine series of mammals, which included specimens of great interest both for display and study.

Some of the more outstanding donations included the following:—An interesting series of marsupials, including a Tree Kangaroo (Dendrolagus matschiei), also a Giant Ant-eater, Paca, Sloth and Black Ape, from the Taronga Park Zoological Trust; the head of an American Bison from Calgary, Canada, from the Australian Board of Control for International Cricket; a series of 50 bats and several rodents from Ysabel, Solomon Islands, collected by Mr. N. S. Heffernan; a small series of mammals from Queensland, from Mr. F. Ferrier Hamilton, and Mr. H. C. Macartney; a very interesting rodent and series of fat-tailed pouched mice (Sminthopsis), Longreach, Queensland, from Mr. F. L. Berney; a collection of immature marsupials, including Phascolarctos, from (the late) J. J. Fletcher; a series of bats, representing two long-eared species, from Mr. L. Macqueen, South Queensland, and two species of bats from the Tumut District, from Miss E. Fraser; a water-rat and rat-kangaroo from Mr. A. S. Le Souef; and additional specimens of an interesting bandicoot from Dr. E. C. Chisholm.

By exchange with the British Museum of Natural History we received two specimens of Rock Wallabies, representing species recently described from Northern Queensland and new to the collection. Purchases included four native cats from the Beaumaris Zoo, Hobart, and a bat, water-rat and series of marsupials from Mr. T. V. Sherrin.

During the year, coincident with the supplying of information regarding acquisitions, old material has been renamed where necessary and identifications checked, notably in regard to the collection of pouched mice, resulting in the discovery of a new genus and several species, which form the subject of a paper now ready for press. In response to requests assistance or data has been supplied to the Chief Secretary's Department regarding the destruction and farming of opossums, to the Department of Agriculture regarding Fruit-bats, and to the Police regarding the Game Act.

The taxidermists treated 506 mammals, of which 119 were new, and after preservation were skinned and either treated or filled-out, and 387 were cleaned and restored. Important restorations were:—A German war service dog for the War Museum; two bisons' heads, one for the Museum gallery, and the other for transfer to the Technological Museum, and the head of a Red Deer for the gallery.

The Australian mammal gallery has been completely overhauled, the case interiors being painted, and their wooden fitments replaced with glass shelving, while the specimens have been restored and suitably rearranged. Similar treatment of the foreign section is now in hand. Periodical disinfection of the stored and exhibition collections has been carried out.

The taxidermists have also given instructions to several collectors regarding the skinning and preservation of mammals,

Skeletons (E. Le G. Troughton in charge).—Outstanding donations included an interesting series of marsupial crania from (the late) J. J. Fletcher; a skeleton of the Giant Ant-eater from the Taronga Park Trust; and jaws and otoliths of fish from Mr. C. L. Bidens of Capetown, South Africa.

The most important acquisitions were a fine specimen of Risso's Grampus which was washed up at Manly, providing the first record of the occurrence of the species in Australian waters, secured by purchase, and a Bushman's skull received in exchange from Dr. R. Broom of South Africa. A fine cast of the Rhodesian human skull was purchased.

Twice during the current year facilities have been afforded Professor Burkitt for the examination of the collection of human crania, and he is at present engaged, with several students, in studying and photographing a large series of skulls.

The preparators of casts and skeletons, besides casting and subsequently skeletonising a small whale (Grampus), cleaned and prepared 109 skulls for storage, besides completing the cleaning of a large elephant, cleaning and restoring a small elephant and a wolverine skeleton.

Reptiles and Amphibians (J. R. Kinghorn in charge).—During the year 425 specimens have been added to the collection. These included a valuable series from South-west Australia, presented by Professor L. Harrison; a collection from Barrington Tops, New South Wales, secured by Messrs. A. Musgrave and T. G. Campbell; and from the Santa Cruz Group, collected by Messrs. E. Le G. Troughton and A. A. Livingstone.

A number of exhibits were removed from the exhibition gallery and prepared for distribution to schools and country museums. Eight gallery groups were renovated, and a number of casts were restored.

The spirit collections were checked by comparison with the card catalogue, and several re-arrangements made.

Birds and Eggs (J. R. Kinghorn in charge).—The collection was largely increased during the year, a total of 3,981 specimens being added. The great increase in comparison with previous years is due to the acquisition of the collection formed by the late Robert Grant, containing 3,777 Australian and foreign birds, many of which are rare or otherwise interesting. This exceedingly valuable gift was secured chiefly by the efforts of Mr. Kinghorn, who interviewed a number of citizens from whom he received the whole of the funds necessary for the purchase of the collection.

The taxidermists have prepared or renovated 145 new skins and 148 old ones, and mounted 151 skins for exhibition. Eight mounted groups and sixteen mounted specimens were cleaned and renovated, and two new groups, the Ptarmigan and Albatross, were added to the gallery. Miss E. A. King has been employed colouring group exhibits and making sketches from life for use in mounting specimens for exhibition.

A Carrier Pigeon was prepared for the War Museum, and a Wedge-tailed Eagle for the Albury Museum; two collections of birds were removed from the gallery, overhauled, and transferred to the Teachers' Training College. Exhibits of insectivorous birds were displayed at Harrington's Ltd., George-street, Sydney, and at the annual exhibition organized by the New South Wales Naturalists' Society. From time to time specimens of mounted birds are placed in the Lecture Hall to assist art students. The Annual Congress of the Australian Ornithologists' Union was held in the Lecture Hall during October, and the collection was made available to members while the Congress was being held.

The renovation and rearrangement of the exhibited series has now been completed, and the mounted and duplicate skin collection overhauled, cleaned and disinfected. Storage space is now very much overcrowded. Two new cabinets were generously presented by Mr. O. C. Beale, Trustee, but additional cabinets are urgently required.

Many shipments of birds were examined and reported on for the Department of Customs; the Chief Secretary, the Department of Agriculture, and many firms have sought information regarding bird pests.

Fishes (G. P. Whitley in charge).—During the year a large number of specimens have been registered. Noteworthy additions include collections from the Santa Cruz Group, obtained by Messrs. Troughton and Livingstone; from Michaelmas Cay, North Queensland, collected by Messrs. Iredale and Whitley; and a fine series of Malayan fishes presented by Mr. D. G. Stead. Officers of H.M.A.S. "Moresby" and "Geranium" contributed collections of fishes from Queensland and Northern Territory. From Mr. M. Ward we obtained some Tasmanian specimens, and Mrs. Miller, Darnley Island, presented some fishes from that locality. A number of trawled fishes from southern New South Wales were received from Messrs. A. Ward and W. Boardman, The Manly Life-Saving Club presented a large saw-fish; and from the Fisheries Branch we received a number of interesting Scombroids. The "Endeavour" Flat-fishes, reported upon by Mr. J. R. Norman, British Museum, have now been received back, and Dr. Johs. Schmidt, Copenhagen, has returned a number of elvers from Long Bay, near Sydney, and lampreys from Prospect, New South Wales. By exchange we received a number of Jewfishes from the South African Museum. The late Surgeon Lieutenant-Commander W. E. J. Paradice, R.A.N., presented a number of micro-slides and X-ray photographs of fishes, and has otherwise added materially to the collections.

A cast of a male Ghost Shark (Chimaera ogilbyi) has been placed on exhibition, and the cast of the Chinaman Fish has been re-coloured.

Information on fishes has been given to many institutions and enquirers, and a special circular on the Leafy Sea Dragon (*Phyllopteryx foliatus*) was prepared by Mr. Whitley in response to the many enquiries regarding this fish. Mr. Whitley also prepared a report on fishes which eat insect larvæ, and identified a number of the species. Other identifications have been made for the Fisheries Branch.

A collection of Scombridæ were sent to Dr. K. Kishinouye for study, and a series of fish heads was forwarded to Dr. H. L. Kesteven for craniological examination.

A collection of fishes was exhibited at the Nature Exhibition of the New South Wales Naturalists' Society, and a small series was given to the Amateur Fishermen's Association.

Considerable progress has been made by Mr. Whitley in preparing for publication the late A. R. McCulloch's "Check-list of the Fishes of Australia,"

Insects and Arachnids (A. Musgrave in charge, T. G. Campbell, assistant).—During the year large collections were received, the most important being from the following donors:—Mr. N. S. Heffernan, but parasites from the Solomon Islands, and insects and spiders from the Santa Cruz Group; Mrs. W. Miller, insects from Darnley Island; Mr. G. Goldfinch, leaf-hoppers from Queensland and New South Wales; Mr. C. T. McNamara, Fijian insects; Mr. A. Musgrave, insects and spiders from Robert's Plateau, Macpherson Range; Mr. W. D. Campbell, insects from Almaden, Queensland; Mr. H. J. Carter, insects from W. Australia, and Barrington Tops, New South Wales; Mr. C. E. Hart, insects from Solomon Islands; the late Thomas Steel, Brazilian insects; the South Australian Museum, beetles.

The Museum has lost a valued friend in the late Dr. E. W. Ferguson, who in the past materially enriched the collections with valuable specimens and types, and was ever ready to place his entomological knowledge at our disposal. Before his death Dr. Ferguson presented a type series of Australian Syrphide.

During the year Mr. Musgrave and Mr. Campbell collected at the Williams River and at National Park, and amassed large collections, while Mr. Troughton and Mr. Livingstone collected a valuable series of insects and arachnids in the Santa Cruz Group, which will later be dealt with by specialists.

The revision of the Australian collections of Orthoptera and Diptera has been undertaken during the year, but most of the work of the Department has been the naming, registering, and labelling of the collections received, in addition to the ordinary routine work.

Research work has been done on poisonous trap-door spiders as the result of the death of a child at Thornleigh, and a paper on the subject is in the press. Other research work has been done on leaf-hoppers and graphosomatid bugs.

Conchology (T. Iredale in charge, Miss J. Allan, assistant).—The accessions reached a large total. Perhaps the most important addition during recent years is the collection made by Messrs. Troughton and Livingstone at Vanikoro, Santa Cruz Group, a locality made classical by the researches of Quoy and Gaimard nearly a hundred years ago, since when no collections have been recorded from there. A preliminary report on this valuable collection is now in the press.

Mr. A. F. Basset Hull presented a large series of extra-Australian shells from the collection of Colonel Beddome, consisting of species named by various European and American authorities, and forwarded to that well known Australian conchologist. From Mr. Hull we also received a collection of marine shells from Macquarie Harbour, West Coast of Tasmania, a locality from which hitherto only two species have been recorded, and which was not previously represented in the collection.

Our regular correspondents, Messrs. W. D. Campbell, Chillagoe, Queensland, G. McAndrew, Shell-harbour, New South Wales, and the Rev. P. Hubbard, Innisfail, North Queensland, continued their donations, many of which are of great interest. The Chillagoe Caves material presented by Mr. Campbell is of special value, as a new faunula has been revealed; a description of these specimens is now in the press.

The collection formed by Messrs. Iredale and Whitley at Michaelmas Cay, North Queensland, has now been analysed and nearly 500 species determined. These comprise a number of new species and several well known New Caledonian shells are now for the first time recognised from Australian waters. Willis Island is, therefore, suggested as an ideal collecting ground, where important data regarding the distribution of the Queensland fauna may be obtained.

Inquiries of economic importance have been attended to, the most important relating to the ravages of "Shipworms" (*Teredinida*), the species of which were investigated and determined on behalf of the Sydney Harbour Trust.

Miss Allan has made many drawings of molluses to illustrate papers published and in preparation, and has also, when called upon, prepared drawings for officers of other Departments.

Marine Invertebrates (F. A. McNeill in charge, A. A. Livingstone and W. Boardman, assistants).— Large numbers of accessions continue to absorb a considerable amount of time in routine work; altogether 1,592 registrations have been made during the past twelve months.

Collections were made in the Santa Cruz Group by Messrs. Troughton and Livingstone. Through the late C. Hedley, Scientific Director of the Barrier Reef Investigation Committee, the Trustees acquired a large collection of Barrier Reef corals. On the recent deaths of J. J. Fletcher, Trustee, and Thomas Steel, F.L.S., both of whom had been liberal donors during their later years, the balance of the collections made by them became the property of the Trustees.


Mr. Melbourne Ward, Honorary Correspondent, an enthusiastic collector, is now travelling in the mid-Pacific and devoting attention on our behalf to the marine invertebrates of that region.

Late in the year the Tunicata collected by the Australasian Antarctic Expedition under the leadership of Sir Douglas Mawson were received back from Liverpool University, whither they had been sent for report by the late Sir William Herdman. The whole of the collection has been overhauled and reconditioned for despatch to another specialist on the group.


Throughout the year constant attention has been necessary to maintain the systematic arrangement and good condition of the large collections of lower invertebrates, and research work has proceeded as time has permitted.

Important work has been carried out in investigation of the attacks by boring crustacea on wharf piles in Port Jackson. A considerable amount of information on the work of these pests has been accumulated, and in due course a report will be prepared for the Harbour Trust Commissioners.

Ethnology (W. W. Thorpe in charge; S. G. Gray, Assistant.) The principal donations during the year were:—the Tongan collection of the late Rev. E. E. Crosby; a series of Patagonian Spear-heads, by Miss Ida Dawson; flaked stone implements from Shellharbour, by Mr. W. W. Thorpe; flaked implements from Lake Macquarie, by the Rev. A. J. Barrett; a large series of aboriginal flake work from the coastal beaches north of Tuggerah, by Messrs. M. S. Stanley and W. W. Thorpe. The Captain Robins collection,

containing several rare Polynesian specimens, was purchased and presented by the Hon. Sir Alfred Meeks, M.L.C. Mr. George McAndrew, Honorary Correspondent, presented a series of stone axes from Illawarra Lake District, and a fine collection of Papuan nose ornaments was received from Mr. M. S. Stanley. Mrs. Steel presented a miscellaneous series of stone implements, mainly Fijian and Australian, which had been collected by her late husband, Thomas Steel.

By purchase a part of the collection of the late David Lindsay was acquired. Mr. Thorpe, during a visit to Morna Point district, collected a large series of flaked implements, including some new forms, and our Santa Cruz specimens were largely augmented by the collections made in the early part of the year by Messrs. Troughton and Livingstone.

By exchange we acquired samples of Tasmanian flaked implements, a large decorated bark bucket from Bathurst Island, Northern Territory, a series of domestic utensils of the historical period from Finland, and replicas of Neolithic stone implements from North-west Europe.

The condition of the collections has been well maintained during the year, and much time was spent in helping outside bodies and institutions. Loans were made to the exhibition of the Naturalists' Society of New South Wales, Kindergarten Teachers, Girls' Week Committees, and others. A series of native weapons was transferred to the Scouts' Hall, Granville.

A new and enlarged edition of "List of New South Wales Aboriginal Place Names and their Meanings" was prepared by Mr. Thorpe, and issued.

Numismatics (W. W. Thorpe in charge; S. G. Gray, assistant.) By donation we acquired a series of Indian and other coins from Colonel I. Elgee; a gold "half dobra" of John V, Portugal, from Miss Lucy Comyn; and a collection of British coins from Messrs. J. Jackson and R. Harrison.

By exchange the collection was increased by over forty pieces.

One of the two show cases in the main hall formerly allotted to coins has been taken over for the display of publications; the series shown there has been regularly changed.

Requests for identification of coins are still increasing in number, and several large collections have been determined.

Palaeontology (C. Anderson in charge, assisted by H. O. Fletcher and W. W. Thorpe.) The principal additions consisted of a series of Permo-carboniferous fossils from Maria Island, Tasmania, presented by Mr. W. S. Dun, Honorary Palaeontologist; a fine collection, containing several new genera and species, obtained by Mr. T. Hodge Smith from the Lower Marine of Harper's Hill, Maitland district; a quantity of shale containing plant and insect remains, from the Permian of Warner's Bay, Newcastle district, presented by the Rev. A. J. Barrett and Mr. W. W. Thorpe. Mr. S. Melvaine presented a small collection of Permo-carboniferous shells and plants from the South Coast District, New South Wales. Some fine examples of belemnites from the Jurassic of Whitby, England, were received from Mr. J. R. Kinghorn. A well-preserved example of the Triassic fish, Cleithrolepis granulatus, from the brick pits, near Hornsby, was presented by Mr. Bullock, and some Tertiary fish remains from the diatomaceous earth deposits at Bugaldi, near Coonabarabran, were contributed by Mr. O. C. Beale, Trustee.

By exchange with the Queensland Museum we received a number of skulls, maxillae, and mandibles of fossil marsupials of the family Macropodidae from the Darling Downs, Queensland; these included examples of a number of species named by the C. W. de Vis.

The collection of fossil marsupials formed by the Department of Mines has been, for the most part, transferred to this Museum. This contains a fine series of fossils, chiefly from the Wellington Caves and from Myall Creek, Bingara. This large collection has been overhauled, sorted, and is now ready for registration.

Mr. H. O. Fletcher has proceeded with the naming and registration of the very large Varney Parkes collection of fossils recently purchased, in which work he has been assisted by Mr. W. S. Dun. Steady progress has been made in the reorganisation and cataloguing of the invertebrates, and this work is now well advanced. The exhibited series of vertebrates has been card catalogued and many new labels printed. The naming, re-arranging and cataloguing of the reference collection of Australian vertebrate fossils has been proceeded with as time permitted.

Mineralogy (T. Hodge Smith in charge; C. M. G. Friend, assistant.) The accessions during the year number 200. Of these, orangite was not previously represented in the collection. Of donations, the most notable are some choice specimens of barite, fluorite, dolomite, and calcite from the Cumberland and other mines, England, presented by Mr. Arthur Combe, of the Uganda Geological Survey. A small collection of Broken Hill minerals was obtained by purchase.

The gold and gem case has been entirely altered and re-arranged. All gems are now mounted on glass stands; the wooden fitments have been replaced by glass shelving supported on nickel rods, the whole exhibit being greatly improved.

Considerable improvement in storage facilities has been effected during the year, but it has been found impossible to make adequate provision for future expansion.

Petrology (T. Hodge Smithin charge; C.M. G. Friend, assistant.) Sixty-three specimens were added during the year. These include a very fine example of a metallic meteorite, weighing 207½ lbs., from Weekaroo Station, Manna Hills, South Australia, which was acquired by purchase. By the courtesy of the Railway Commissioners, this is being cut at the Eveleigh Railway Workshops, and it will then be analysed and described. A portion, weighing 25-6 grams, of the "Kingoonya" aerolite, South Australia, was presented by Mr. Cook, and a portion of the "Mount Magnet" siderite from the Murchison Gold Field. Western Australia, was acquired by exchange. Two foreign meteorites have been added to the collection.

No proper arrangements have yet been made for the storage of rock collections, and in consequence many rocks are packed away in bulk.

16. GENERAL.

The negatives taken by Captain Frank Hurley during his expeditions to Papua in 1920-21 and 1922-23 were purchased by the Trustees, and constitute a very valuable acquisition. This splendid collection includes about 1,100 negatives, embracing a large number of native studies, views of ceremonial gatherings, pictures of native industries and architecture, landscape views, as well as an interesting series illustrating the pearling industry, coral reefs, and marine life.
