PREFACE.

THE original proposal for the formation of an Ethnological Collection in the Garden Palace included—

- 1st. The erection of full-sized typical models of the habitations of man, and of the buildings used for public purposes by the various races found in the South Pacific Ocean, together with samples of the natural history surroundings of each tribe.
- 2nd. Specimens of articles of costume and personal ornament, and of those used in ceremonies; weapons of warfare and of the chase; articles of furniture and of pottery; implements and machines used in agriculture and other industries.
- 3rd. Specimens of food, animal and vegetable.

It is much to be regretted that the very short time and limited means and space at the disposal of the Ethnological sub-committee rendered it impossible to carry out the above programme in its entirety. An opportunity so well calculated to stimulate collection, and to exhibit the results under such specially favourable circumstances will not probably occur again, and the period is rapidly approaching when all opportunity for obtaining the most valuable representative specimens of Ethnology, showing the habits and customs of the uncivilized people of these seas, will have ceased to exist.

While however, regretting their inability to accomplish more, the sub-committee on Ethnology are glad to feel that their efforts have been in so large a degree successful, and that their invitations for the loan of specimens have been liberally responded to, not only by the various Intercolonial Governments but also by private individuals, and that the result has been the gathering together for comparison and study of perhaps the most complete collection yet formed of articles illustrative of Polynesian Ethnology.

Commodore Wilson, R.N., on being asked, gave his cordial co-operation, and in a cruise to the South Seas collected many valuable exhibits which have a place in this Catalogue. The Missionary Societies would have contributed but for the shortness of the notice given; the agent of the London Missionary Society (Rev. J. P. Sunderland) has, however, sent a collection from Port Moresby, New Guinea.

The total number of specimens exhibited is 5,200. These have been systematically classified according to their respective localities, and the greatest care has been taken to keep the weapons, costumes, and implements of each Island Group distinct.

The arrangement of the Ethnological Gallery was commenced on September 1st, and it was opened to the public on 11th November, when it was officially visited by His Excellency Lord Augustus Loftus and suite, and by the Premier of the Colony, Sir Henry Parkes, K.C.M.G.

The present Catalogue is merely an enumeration of the various articles, but the Committee has recommended the publication of a complete descriptive and illustrated Catalogue of this valuable collection, as part of the permanent records of the Sydney International Exhibition.

APPENDIX.

HISTORY OF THE CARVED HOUSE "MATATUA"

(Exhibited by the New Zealand Government at the Sydney International Exhibition.)

THE idea of the house first originated with Hohaia Matatehokia, chief of the Ngatipukeko tribe, who decided to build a house and represent all his ancestors in it, and to reconcile the tribes Ngatiawa and Urewera, between whom there existed much ill-feeling in consequence of murders perpetrated by the latter tribe during the war. The house was completed in 1874. In March, 1875, it was opened by the late Sir Donald McLean with great demonstrations, in the presence of many hundreds of Native and European visitors.

The image on each post represents the ancestor of some tribe or sub-tribe. The principal one is Toi, from whom the whole Native race is supposed to have sprung; his figure is carved on the bottom of the middle post in company with Awa and Toroa. The front pole represents the figure of Kahungunu, ancestor of the Hawke's Bay Natives, Rongowhakaata, ancestor of the Poverty Bay Natives, and Te Whatuiapiti, another ancestor of the Hawke's Bay Natives. The small image represents Te Ngarara, who was killed many years ago while trading off Whale Island. The second small image represents Te Maitaranui, grandfather of Wepiha Apanui, and of Mr. Faloona, who was murdered at Whakatane some years ago. The carving on the ridge-pole in front of the house represents Ruamoana and Matearehe, ancestors of Ngatipukeko tribe; also Awatope, a god. The image on top of the ridge-pole represents Mokoera, father of Apanui. The twin images on the right hand of the porch represent Taitimuroa and Wahahamama, ancestors of the Patuai tribe. The twin images on the left of the building represent Tarakiuta and Tarakitai; these twins were boys belonging to the Rongowhakaata tribe. Tupurupuru, a chief of Poverty Bay, was by right entitled to the first of the preserved birds—in fact, to a royalty on all birds killed in Poverty Bay; but on these twins reaching maturity, he would lose it, as they were from an elder branch of the family. He therefore determined to get rid of them, and accordingly dug a deep pit across a road where the twins were in the habit of spinning tops. One day he sent them out to play, and so they fell into the pit prepared for them, and were killed. The footboard across the front of the porch represents Oniawa, ancestor of the Ngatiawa, and the image on it was carved by a Fijian named Kune,

in honor of Thakobau, of Fiji. The posts on the right of the house represent Kiore, Paraheka, Taha, Pakakaho, and Hikapehiwai, ancestors of the Ngatiawa; Te Kakahotararo, ancestor of the Te Kaha Natives; Te Imuwhakapuru, ancestor of Ngatipukeko, Tuteao, and Rangihouhiri, ancestors of the Ngatiawa; Hikareia, father of Hori Tupaea, chief of Tauranga; Te Rangi Kawehea, ancestor of the chief Rangitukehu, of Rangitaiki; and Matekitatahi, ancestor of the Whanauapanui tribe. The posts on the left side represent Te Rangitumau and Tamaruarangi, ancestors of Ngatiawa; and Te Harawaka, ancestor of Te Whanauapanui. The mermaid is called "Te Makarini," after Sir Donald McLean. The next posts represent Waikapuku, Te Tawha, Pirauwhenua, and Tamawhiro, ancestors of the Ngatiawa; Apanui, ancestor of the Whanauapanui tribe; Te Hukitu, ancestor of Ngatirangi; Te Kama-a-Pakui, Tahakaiaora, and Umutaha, ancestors of the Ngatiawa. On the inside of the porch the figures represent Iratumoana, Whetenui, and Kohi, ancestors of Ngatiawa. All these ancestors are descendants of the crew of "Matatua." The Taranaki Ngatiawa are not represented in the house, as they were supposed to have left their shipmates, and had no further communication with them. The descendants of the crew of "Matatua" appear to have kept themselves distinct from the crew of "Te Arawa," although living within a few miles of one another.
